<u>George W. Littleton</u>, our grocery man, has taken in a partner. Her name is Miss <u>Lizzie</u> <u>Grammer</u>. They were married in Hanover and came to Clayton the same day.

<u>Cambridge</u> - page 5 - <u>Fred Morton's</u> wife died January 23rd of complications of diseases. She left two small children. Fred's father came to him and arrived the evening that his wife died. Fred never having seen him since he was bound out at the age of three weeks.

<u>Bummah</u> - page 5 - It was just five weeks almost to an hour from the time <u>Wme</u> <u>Parker</u> and <u>T</u>. <u>J</u>. <u>Wyman</u> arranged for their debate on free moral agency until Mr. Parker breathed his last. Mr. Parker was taken sick before the time came to debate the question and continued to go down until the end came. Mr.Parker was a soldier in the late war and afterwards served three years in the regular army. Funeral services were held at the residence of E.Pickles. The remains were deposited in the city of the dead, at Weston, Mich.

Madison - page 5 - Miss Anna Binns was married to <u>A</u>. <u>W</u>. Smith, of McKeesport, Pa., last week Wednesday.

<u>Dover</u> - page 5-<u>Mrs</u>. <u>Calhan</u> died last Wednesday of pneumonia, resulting from the grip.

<u>Deerfield</u> - page 5 - Mrs. <u>Mary Bodette</u> died very suddenly Saturday morning in Toledo, of relapse being sick only a few days. Her husband, <u>John</u> <u>Bodette</u>, died about one year ago of blood poisoning. Shortly after her husband's death she found good place for her children, three of them in number. The many friends of <u>Mr</u>. <u>and Mrs</u>. <u>Henry Robinson</u> and family are pleased to learn of the convalesence of their son, <u>Fred</u>, who has been so long and so seriously ill from typhoid fever. The fullest sympathy is also extended to them in their bereavement in the loss of two beautiful daughters from the same disease.

Henry Heifron, a former citizen of Adrian and well known to the people, died Thursday morning at his home near Lyons, Ohio. The deceased was a member of Woodbury Post, GAR of this city and generally like by those who know him.

<u>G. Roscoe Swift</u> was surprised by the presentation of a fine gold headed cane given by the M. P. Sunday School of this city. Mr. Swift is a leading worker in the church and Sunday school and a sterling Probib.

(page 1, col. 4) - Laid to Rest - But a few days ago <u>Dr. J. B. Abbott</u> of Clayton, was the picture of health, Wednesday of last week he was laid to rest with his father. Dr. Abbott was born and raised in the village, taught school there and graduated at Adrian High School in 1879, after which he fitted himself for the Practice of Medicine at Ann Arbor. He located at his boyhood home and had built up a large practice. His estimable wife, <u>Mrs. Eloise Baker</u>, is left with two bright children to mourn her great loss. The funeral occured at M. E. Church at Clayton of which organization he had long been an active and influential member. (February 20,1890 continues:)

Your scribe started out on a tour of investigation and found that there was a wedding at the residence of O. H. White, the contrating parties being <u>C. B. Ashley</u> and <u>Chloe</u> <u>Underwood</u>. Mr. Ashley is one of Dovers starting Prohibs, while his bride is one of Palmyra's talented daughters.

<u>Madison & Fairfield</u> - page 5 - At Joseph Rynd's on Wednesday, occurs the annexation of Canada to the United States. The parties to the transaction are <u>Gordon Reid</u> of Canada and <u>Fanny Rynd</u>, of the United States. We hope this settles the fishery guestion.

<u>Clayton</u> - page 8 - <u>Rev</u>. <u>Iler</u> and <u>May</u> <u>Rowley</u> are to be married on Wednesday this week.

<u>Britton</u> - page 8 - <u>Mrs. Lodina</u> <u>Beach</u> died Tuesday morning, February 18th, in her son-in-laws home, where she has resided for some time, Mr. & Mrs. Seger's of eastern Ridgeway. March 6,1890

<u>General News</u> - page 1, col. 2 - <u>Deacon Wm</u>. <u>Bennett</u>, an old pioneer, after a protracted illness, died Monday in his 76th year. He had been in Adrian since 1855.

(page 1, col. 3) - 'Killed Himself' - <u>Lafayette Morse</u> has lived for many years about three miles south of Jasper. Wednesday afternoon of last week he locked himself in a bedroom in his house and deliberately shot himself through the head with a revolver. He leaves a wife, two daughters and a son, one daughter being married.

(page 1, col 3) - 'Death of an Old Pioneer' - 'Uncle ' Joseph Camburn passed away at his home in Tipton, Sunday morning, aged 94. He was born in New Jersey in 1796 coming to Michigan in 1828. He erected his home on a farm in 1832, moving there with his family in February, 1833. His wife and four daughters have gone before and four sons and four daughters survive him. (page 6, col. 3) - <u>Mrs. David Jerrells</u>, mother of <u>Joseph Knapp</u> and <u>Mrs.</u> <u>Wm. <u>Miller</u>, died Saturday morning at the home of the latter, No. 20 N. McKenzie St., of pneumonia. She was 77 years old.</u>

Mrs. Isaac Howland of North Adrian, died very suddenly Sunday morning last. Mrs. Howland had been an invalid for several years. She was one of the county's old pioneers.

<u>Ridgeway</u> - page 8 - The sudden death of <u>Clayton Smith</u>, son of <u>Charles</u> <u>C. Smith</u>, has the sympathy of the community. This is the second death from diphtheria in the vicinity. The other two children of Mr. Smith's are recovering.

(page 4, col.2) - <u>H. B. Matthias</u>, an Addison tobacco man, was drowned at Jackson last week. He was found in the river and it is supposed to be a case of suicide.

<u>William Edwin Young</u>, youngest son of John Young, Jr., was born in Ogden, Lenawee County, Mich., October 10th, 1862 and died at the home of his father's in Toledo, Ohio, March 10th, 1890, of tonsilitis and bronchitis, aged 27 years. The remains were brought to Blissfield on the train and conveyed to Zion Cemetery. Edwin was unmarried and was a robust young man, but his sickness only lasted about eight days. He has been employed as brakeman on the railroad for about eight years of which the last four has been spent on the Wabash.

Last fall Mr. & Mrs. Wing went to visit his daughter in Washington Territory and while abroad Mr. Wing fell victim to the prevailing disease which was heightened by a severe cold which he contracted enroute for home in March, last, and which resulted in pneumonia and death on the 11th of April. <u>Rev. Lewis H. Keller</u> of Edgerton, Wisconsin and <u>Nettie C. Hardy</u> of Adrian were married at the M. E. Church in the city on Thursday. They will locate in the west where Mr.Kellar is pastor of a flourishing Congregational Church.

<u>Mrs. Nancy Boyd</u>, who has been sick for several months past and whose illness has baffled the skill of her physician, breathed her last on yesterday morning at early hour. Mrs. Boyd was 68 years of age, the widow of the late <u>James Boyd</u> and had lived in Raisin many years. She leaves three sons, <u>Robert M.</u>, <u>James A.</u>, <u>Archie R.</u> and one daughter, <u>Mrs. R. B. House</u> of Springfield, Ohio.

(page 3, col. 1) - Thomas W. Davis, one of the old residents of Adrian, died very suddenly at the residence of his son on South Main street.

Edith, seems to be a gay and festive maiden whose absence from the community will cause no regret. She originally hailed from somewhere in Maine and several. Michigan people wish she would go back and stay.

<u>William Ladd</u> died at his home in Hudson township June 2nd, from a stroke of paralysis, after a severe struggle of 48 hours. He was 68 years and 7 months old and leaves a wife and three sons tomourn. He was

Some six or seven bachelor doctors have settled in Weston since the place first started, and the singular thing about it is that they all got married before they left. and stranger still not one of them married a Weston girl. Mr.<u>Orra Ferguson</u>, died at his residence in the township of Fairfield, Thursday, March 12th, 1891. He was born in the township of Nassan, VanRensselaer County, N.Y., February 26, 1808 thus making him at the time of his death 83 years and 14 days old. He lived with his parents until about 15 years of age, then he commenced working around the country. In 1828 at the age of twenty he came to Lenawee County; in 1831 he took up 120 acres in Madison, where he lived for three years; then purchased a farm in Fairfield, which township has been his home ever since. He was one of a family of 12 children; only five survive: Hiram of Fairfield, Jeremiah of Rome, Henry of Benton Harbor, Mrs. Dr. Layerty of Fairfield, Mrs. Rhoda Livesay of Toledo.

November 4, 1830 married to <u>Cynthia W. Baker</u>, she died in November, 1888. They were parents of two children: <u>Henry E.</u>, who lives on the old homestead and <u>Lucy J.</u>, wife of <u>A. W. Allen</u> of Weston. The burial was in Fairfield Cemetery.

P.</u>, a business man of N.Y. city; <u>Helen</u> <u>Mariah</u>, who died in Albion, N.Y.; <u>Mrs. George Eldredge</u> of this city; and <u>Fred</u>, who died March 11, 1884. Mrs. Gaston died February 17, 1881, just ten years and one month to a day before her husband.

(Obit. of Rollin Robinson continues:) In 1841 he went to Buffalo, where his brother, <u>E. D. Robinson</u>, he was engaged in the forwarding and commission business. In the Fall of 1842, he returned to Michigan and engaged in buying grain and soliciting freight for the American Transportation Co. In the Spring of 1843 he was appointed Michigan agent of the Michigan Southern Railroad at Adrian. In 1847, the road was sold and he returned to Buffalo and with his brother purchased a line of canal boats and remained in this until 1854. At that time he accepted the agency of Consoledated American Transportation, which position he filled until 1860, when in account of ill health, he returned to Palmyra to reside on his farm south-east of the village. He was the first constable and collector, after its organization as a township, was elected supervisor in 1837-38 and in 1864-65; was justice of peace three terms.

He was married February 12, 1835 to <u>Celestia</u> Ann, daughter of <u>Ziba</u> and <u>Emma</u> <u>Corbst</u>, of Palmyra, Mich. To them was born one child, <u>Margaret S.</u>, who died in Adrian, aged 4 years. Mrs. Robinson died in Palmyra, May 17th, 1885, of his nine brothers and sisters only two survive him.

Crego</u>, of South Winter street, who so acceptably filled the position of Street Commissioner during Mayor Corbin's adminstration, is now only able to get about with considerable difficulty, on account of his advanced years, but he manages to get downtown at least once a week and is just as full of early reminiscences as ever.

He came to this section in 1830 and has lived here 51 years. As he told a 'Telegram' reporter of how he tracked a deer all the way from Tecumseh to here in his boyhood days on a Sunday, got lost in the wilderness, nearly starved and finally found shelter in a cabin. He believes that incident of Sabbath desecration will never forget to serve him as a lesson. Tecumseh in those days was the county seat and the place of this section, though it had but about 200 inhabitants.(He is also a railroad pioneer, an article on June 24, 1893 page one)

The train was made up by taking bodies from stage coaches and placing them on trucks that had been manufactured to run on strap rail tramway.

Our city as shocked Friday evening to learn of the death of the Hon. William S. Wilcox at his home on South Main. At 7:10 p.m. he passed away, after a violent coughing spell. In the death of Mr. Wilcox, Adrian loses one of its strongest leaders. Mr. Wilcox was the son of <u>Austin and Clarissa Wilcox</u> and was born in the town of Riga, Monroe County, N. Y. on the 25th day of April, 1819. When he was yet a child his parents moved into the town of Bergen, Genessee Couty, that state where he lived on a farm, his father at the time managing a hotel, stages, postoffice, etc.

In the year 1836, he came to west, Milan, Ohio, where he entered the dry goods store for Ira Bidwell as a clerk. He then removed to Adrian, arriving September 13, 1836 and where he was still in the employ of Mr. Bidwell, who had moved his goods from Milan to Adrian. He remained in the store till 1840, in which year he became partner with Mr. Bidwell and continued until January, 1844, when the latter disposed his interest to the former. In the spring of that year Mr. Wilcox began business for himself. Soon after discontinuing the dry goods business, he started a hardward store, under the firm name of Wilcox and Chappell, after 18 months, he purchased the interest of Mr. Chappell and he continue the business alone untik 1867, when his brother, Henry, became his partner.

In 1880 he became one of the owners of the Commercial Savings Bank and now it is called Adrian State Savings Bank. In 1864 Mr. Wilcox was elected a member of the legislature of Michigan and held that office for two terms. In 1869 he was appointed state prison inspector by Gov. Baldwin and was immediately president of the board. In 1866 he was elected president of the Michigan State insurance company, which position he held for 17 years. He had been for many years president of the Oakwood Cemetery Association. He became an active member of the Adrian Fire Department in 1841 and continued until the paid department (continues)

was organized, having served 21 years. He was superintendent for a half a century of the Baptist Sunday School.

Mr. Wilcox first married at Benton, Ind., to <u>Sarah Frances Clay</u>, daughter of <u>Rev</u>. <u>Bradbury S. Clay</u>, by whom three children were born, two of whom died infancy; and <u>George A.</u>, the only remaining one. The first wife died the 12th of February, 1852 and the second marriage took place on the 17th of August of 1854. On that day he was united with <u>Josephine Southworth</u>, daughter of <u>Dr. Wm. Southworth</u>, of Avon Springs, N.Y.

The death of Col. N. B. Eldredge occurred Monday at 4 o'clock at his home on Hunt street. Col. <u>Nathaniel Bael Eldridge</u> was born in Cayuga County, N.Y. on March 28, 1813, in the then young city of Auburn. His father, <u>Daniel</u>, was a Captain in the American Army in the War of 1812. He received an academic education and commenced teaching at 16. He was appointed a cadet at West Point by President Jackson, but decline because his father could not furnish the outfit.

Four years later he commenced the study of medicine under the direction of his brother, <u>Dr. H. D. Eldredge</u> and graduated from Fairfield, N.Y. Medical College. The October following he came to Oakland county, this state and from 1837 to 1843 engaged in the practice of his profession. In the meantime he had been married to <u>Jeannette Patten</u>, April 21, 1839. In 1843 he moved to Lapeer and continued practice medicine until 1853. Meantime he officated as justice of the peace, chairman of the board of supervisors, etc. In 1845 he was a clerk of the senate and in 1848 a member of the house.

He was next elected judge of the Probate Court of Lapeer. In 1853 he was appointed postmaster of Lapeer. Upon the outbreak of the rebellion, he was the first man to enlist from Lapeer County. His company was assigned to the Seventh Infantry and before the regiment left the state, he was appointed major. In 1865 he moved to this city and commenced practice of law. In 1870 he was elected mayor of Adrian. In 1874 he was elected sheriff of Lenawee county. In 1882 he was successful in the Demorcatic race for congress and also in 1884. His term ended 1887.

There was born to Col. Eldredge seven sons and four daughters. His eldest son, <u>L</u>. <u>B</u>. during the war was a major of the Fourth Michigan Cavalry, and after the war sheriff of Lapeer county. His second son, <u>Lewis T</u>. was for many years teller of the Lenawee County Savings Bank. <u>Daniel B</u>. was in 1879 appointed station master and freight agent at Quincy. <u>George H</u>. a portrait painter of rare merit, is now here. <u>John B</u>. is now in the postal service as a letter carrier. The youngest son, <u>David B</u>. is in Buffalo, in the Lake Shore road's employ. The two daughters <u>Louisa A</u>. and <u>Ella</u>, the oldest resides at home and the younger is the wife of Wm. Smith of Ionia.

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Double Tragedy

(page 2, col. 2) A terrible double tragedy took place this morning, on the farm of <u>worge</u> <u>S. Conger</u>, one mile west and a half mile south of Clinton. As a consequence Conger and <u>Dow Draper</u> are dead. Draper shot through the heart with a shotgun and Conger through the head with a ball from the revolver.

Conger was the owner of about 138 acres, left him by the death of his grandfather about three years ago. He was married to a <u>Anna Steiger</u> and it is understood all the property is now in her name. She has a mother and three sisters living in the village.
